

Greetings Circle Masters. You know what time it is? Flying Season! After a way colder than normal month, the weather has improved and it's flying time. Is all of your equipment ready to go? How about batteries? They have likely been laying around doing nuthin' since last fall, so get them charged up and ready to go. I dug out an old battery charger/cycler that I used for R/C batteries back before I saw the light and went to control line. I am now using it to charge up my glow starter batteries. The nickel metal hydride batteries don't really need cycling like the old ni-cads did, but its interesting to see how long it takes to discharge them. I have been using the same twelve volt field battery for over ten years and it still seems to be OK. I guess I got my money's worth out of that. Take a good look at the lines you are planning on using too. The lines are the number one safety issue while flying and you wouldn't want someone getting clobbered by a fly away model if they should fail. That would be bad PR, not to mention what it would do to your poor airplane.

As you recall, the meeting is not being held until the second Saturday in May because of the dog show. In conjunction with the meeting, it is supposed to be installation day for the field equipment box at the flying site. I don't have the details regarding when we are meeting to do this project. If someone has the info, please send out a mass email and fill us all in. It would be better to have extra people there leaning on shovels, just like county workers, than not enough to get the job done. I am planning on bringing a gasoline post hole digger to make things a little easier. Other people have committed to bringing other tools. Hopefully we will also get some flying in. Here's an engine project I have been working on. It's a Magnum .15 set up per Dallas Sport Goodyear racing rules. The engine was the subject of the bearing article I did a couple months ago. It also has a venturi made according to the techniques in another previous *Circulator* article. The needle valve assembly is a Super Tigre style unit from RSM. The spinner nut was turned from a piece of half inch 6061 aluminum hex stock on my sherline lathe. It should be all ready for some bench runs.

The Trailing Edge by Wayne M. Schmidt

Back a few months ago I wrote an article about model decals. In it, I talked about mainly water slide type decals and a product that allows ease of application of them. Now I will switch to another model decal or rather the sticker type.

When I began my construction of a Laird Super Solution I began wondering where I could find the correct decals for it. I had built a small plastic model of the Solution and could see how detailed some of the decals would need to be. There was no way I could make them with my computer. This model has a forty-inch wing span, so many of the decals needed to be large to fit the scale of the model. I searched the web for a solution (Pun intended) but could only find the usual P-51, P-47, B-17, etc. Absolutely nothing for Golden Age Racers. I could wind up with a nice model but with no details. What to do. But I kept on building.

At the next club meeting I mentioned my tale of woe and luckily to the right member. He asked if I had checked out a company called Callie Graphics? I replied that I had not but would give them a look. Wow, what a web site. They showed some very nice WWII fighter decals and they are available in any scale. But as I suspected they had none for a Laird Super Solution. No problem though as they have a custom program. Luckily, in that plastic model of the Solution two decal sheets were included. So now I had my sample. At the same time, I also wanted a set for a Gee Bee R-1 of the same scale. In the case of the Gee Bee, I had a set left over from a Dare stick model so now I had my second sample. I sent an email asking how to proceed and if they could copy the samples which I would send. The quick reply was, no problem, we will scan and resize them then email a price, which turned out to be very reasonable. I gave them my approval and a week and a half later I had my beautiful decals.

Now, these decals are the peal and stick type. To apply, you pull of the rear backing, hold the front cover and then carefully apply where you want it placed. But, beware that the actual decal is very sticky so be sure of your location. You will not get a second chance. As you are placing the decal on you can use a credit card to smooth the decal as it is installed. Then slowly peel away the top cover and there you have it. Yes, you can brush clear dope over it without worry. So, weather you order a stock set or something custom you can be assured of a high-quality product at a reasonable price.
